

Between the years 1769 and 1774, settlements had been made by the Cooks from the Virginia Valley on Indian Creek (one of their number, John, being killed by the Indians), the Woods on Rich Creek, the Grahams on the Greenbrier, and others near Keeney's Knobs. Cook's Fort was on Indian Creek about three miles from New River, Wood's fort on Rich Creek on a farm recently owned by the family of John Karnes, and about 4 miles East of the present village of Peterstown in the County of Monroe. The Keeneys built Keeney's fort near Keeney's Knobs.

The Snidows, Lybrooks, Chapmans and McKensy built Snidow's fort at the upper end of the Horseshoe farm on New River, in what is now GilesCounty. While this attack upon Donnally's Fort was being threatened and made, a number of men gathered at Jarrett's and Keeney's Fort, made up in part of men from Captain Joseph Refroe's company from Bedford County amoung them Josiah Meadows who makes a full statement in regard thereto in his declaration for a pension before the County court of Giles County in the year of 1832.

JOHN D. KEENEY'S OF RAVENSWOOD AND JACKSON COUNTY

(This is an update and revision of pages 14-15 of 2,597 KEENEY RELATIVES, based on many documents unavailable in 1975-78. John D. Keeney was a nephew, not a son of Moses & Frances Harris Keeney. Their son, John C. Keeney, was engaged in the river business with his brothers, living in Kanawha Co., WV, Scioto Co., Ohio and Boyd Co., KY. He married Sarah Elizabeth Farney in Lawrence Co., OH.)

8. DAVID JACKSON KEENEY, b. 1818, d. 12-19-1888; With the growing riverboat activity, local businessmen in Ravenswood began to take advantage of the situation by selling food and accommodations. Perhaps most significant and enduring was the Ravenswood House which was constructed at the top of the river bank in 1848 by A. J. Keeney. After Keeney it was operated by John Counts, a son-in-law named Shanks, and W. C. McConnell. Almost overnight the word spread along the river that Ravenswood was a good place to stop on a steamer, if for no other reason than to eat and stay overnight at the Ravenswood House. Later it would receive additional charm when the room numbers from the *Emma Graham* steamer wrecked in Millwood would be placed above the room entrances. It would achieve an international reputa-

tion as a "splendid place to get away from the jittery world" when it was recommended by Duncan Hines. Other national travel services would also recommend it.

Hotel keeper and builder of the famous Ravenswood House Inn on the Ohio River; listed as Sheriff in 1870 census and as a Republican candidate for sheriff in another reference. Confederate troops captured and ransacked Ravenswood House in September 1862. Owner "Jack" Keeney sued their leader, Albert Jenkins in a Virginia court and collected damages. m. Diamond Woman quilts time away

When she began her craft, she started small by making baby quilts and giving them to her

Francis Keeney doesn't want to take much credit for her work, which she calls "just country stuff."

But her quilts have won awards and competitions across the state which would lead one to correctly believe she's just modest.

Keeney, who lives in Diamond, began quilting with a church group when she lived in Logan County. It wasn't easy at first. She was just a little confused about what to do with a thimble.

"A lot of people I knew were in a quilting group and they encouraged me to try." she said. "I didn't even know what finger to put the thimble on. Finally, they taught me how."

grandchildren. "I didn't think I could do it at first, and then I finished one." she said. "I couldn't believe it."

Keeney always appreciated crafts, but never had much luck with them herself. "I'm just not patient enough to knit or crochet." She said. "I just get nervous." But she finds quilting relaxing if she's in the right mood. "I may so all day long-maybe I'll just get in the mood," Keeney said. "Then one day I'll just quilt all day. I think one of the joys quilting is being able to go at your own pace." Keeney has lived at

Diamond for three years. Before she moved to Kanawha County she lived in Arnoldsburg, which she calls the country.

"When I lived out in the country I did a lot more quillting," she said. "Now I have a lot of people coming to visit me and there's a lot more to do down here. I just don't have the time to quilt like I used to."

And to quilt for her family would take a lot of time. She has 10 siblings, children, grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. "They all keep me pretty busy."

Her favorite time to quilt is in the winter when there's "not much else to do."

Keeney doesn't use a diagram or graph is a pattern for quilts. She simply measures them and figured how big the

"I usually change them in some way," Keeney said. "I just get the basic idea from what I see. But I'll put something on the quilt that is definitely mine.

"I like to look at quilts and just notice one thing so that I can tell it's mine."

She has displayed her work at the Cultural Center and in Beckley, and was awarded ribbons at the Boone County fair in Madison and also at the Molasses Festival in Arnoldsburg.

"I had given my son two baby quilts and then later found out that they had took them to the fair at Madison and they took first place," Keeney said. "I just couldn't believe it. After that I started to enter them in fairs."

She's won ribbons for almost everything she's entered. But if she was awarded money she gave it

back. "I would just donate it back to the group," she said. "It wasn't usually very much."

Her most expensive quilt is one that she sold for \$500. Keeney said that she has given many away because she doesn't really sell that many."

Keeney worked making quilts for Cabin Creek Quilts for two years. She still visits them to look at designs they have created.

"I'm not a hoarder though," Keeney said. "I'll give them to my family or people that I think will appreciate them. I don't get that people who use them to have a picnic or cover their lawn furniture with. I give them to people will put them on the bed or hang them up."

She said that sometimes it's really tough to part with the quilts. "After you've worked on something for a long time, you want to make sure it goes to the right person."

Taking care of the quilt once you have it is easy, according to Keeney.

History one man's legacy to his hometown of East Bank

"Surely, someday in the future, someone who lives among us will want to know more about our community than they have ever been able to find out from ordinary books or from a conversation the other persons who are supposed to have the right answers to certain questions about the town, or about earlier residents. It's for this reason I am now attempting this history of our community and hoping these pages shall be left in the hands of one who will be willing to share the story with others."

So wrote Edgar Keeney in his 1977 history of East Bank, which appears in the hot off the press "East Bank-Celebrating 100 Years." He died in 1987 without doing anything with his history. When he died, the pages fell in the lap of daughter Linda Ellis.

Ellis seized the perfect opportunity to satisfy her father's wishes.

"The three of us (Rose Hammond and Jeanene Kirk also had a big hand in '100 years') had in the backs of our minds that 1989 was the centennial of the town," said Ellis, a postmistress at the Cabin Creek post office in Chelyan. "That's always been ingrained in my mind-East Bank was incorporated in 1889. And Daddy was so civic minded. He dearly loved East Bank. So you can see why I seized the opportunity."

Ellis, Hammond and Kirk, who grew up together in East Bank, organized a committee of 12 other interested people and the book was born. Using Keeney's history, old and new pictures and recollection of committee members, the group has produced a 64 page, paperback booklet.

It differs from the ordinary history book in that long, tedious family histories are absent. The long historical account of any length is Keeney's. A small selection appears about Ethel Taylor, Hammond's mother.

Rather, committee members chose to recall old landmarks, forms of recreation and "the way things were" in making up the bulk of the booklet.

The booklet also contains novelty items. Ellis showed some hipness by including the words to John Mellencamp's "small town" on page 2, while another page is devoted to discussion of a rock with Indian sketches on a supposedly submerged in the Kanawha River near the eastern end of town. "We feel like we really accomplish something in making people aware of the town's history," Ellis said. "I'm sad it's over. I'd like to do it over again."

What would Edgar think of the book?

"He'd love it." Ellis said. "I'm sure he would."

INDIAN WARS of OREGON 1855

First Meadows campaign

James Bruce remained as major, commanding the "left column" (southern battalion), and Charles S. Drew continued in his place as adjutant. Col. Williams' regiment was officially styled the second regiment of the Oregon mounted volunteers, and consisted of time of the colonel's election, the companies of Captains Bailey, Bouy, Keeney, Rice, O'Neal, Wilkinson, Alcorn, Gordon, Chapman, and Bledsoe, the aggregate on paper being 901 rank-and-file, but the effective force was much less. This opposing force lay the greater part of the winter separately stationed at various points wherever their services were required as guards. Occasionally something occurred to break the stagnant routine of camp life, but not often. An Indian raid might be expected, else the war would have lost all attraction. The main body of the Army, lying in what is now Josephine County, centered at Vannoy's as their headquarters. The right column remained about the southern boundary of Douglas County.

Almost the only interesting bit of information of a jocular character which survives to this day is the memorable trip of Capt. Keeney from his post to the verdure-clad plains of the Willamette. Captain Keeney was dissatisfied with guard duty. He hungered for a sight of the hills of Lane County. He applied to Colonel Williams for a furlough, but his commanding officer refused, saying no furloughs would be granted until the last Indian in Southern Oregon was killed. The captain persisted; the Colonel told him to "go to grass. " Captain Keeney returned to his command and indignantly related the story of his wrongs, when a private suggested, "he probably meant the Willamette; that's the only grass we've seen." The Captain, elated, said, "Boys, shall we go to grass?" The answer is unanimously affirmative. They broke their camp, a hundred strong, arrived in Roseburg, December 27, and were in sight of their own homes in time to wish their friends a happy new year. The joke was a good one; but Lieut. Col. William J Martin failed to see it as such. He made it a part of his official business to prefer charges against the homesick farmers who found the war so different from their joyous anticipations. This stern martinet accused Capt. Keeney of disobedience to orders, abandoning his position in the face of the enemy, "uniform ungentlemanly conduct," and other like charges a formidable tenor. The governor suspended him, but at a later date, as we perceive, the company

with their captain were restored to all the rights and privileges pertaining to the most obedient, steady and reliable of soldiers.
