

Keeney Update

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WILLIAM PERRY KEENEY

William Perry Keeney was the son of Jonathan Keeney, and the grandson of Rev. Jonathan Anthony Keeney. Perry was born Sept. 9, 1845 in Montgomery Co., Indiana. He came with his parents, brothers and sisters to Iowa in 1848. At that time Des Moines was a fort on the west side of the river. The Keeney family settled on the east side of the river where Perry's uncle, Charles Keeney, had established the town of Avon. Perry's father had a blacksmith shop at Avon, and formed horse shoes, nails and wagon parts on the anvil.

At the time of the Civil War, Perry ran away to join the troops, but his age was discovered and he was returned home. As soon as he was 18 he enlisted and served in Company B, 10th Iowa Infantry for three years. The grandchildren and great-grandchildren were fascinated by the little dial resting on the mantel containing the "grape" shot and "minie balls" removed from Grandpa's leg during the war.

At the age of 24 Perry married Nancy Ellen Keeney, who was 15 and a first cousin once removed. She was the great-granddaughter of Rev. Jonathan Anthony Keeney. Her grandfather was Charles Keeney, and her father Jonathan A. Keeney.

They raised their family on an 80 acre farm in Polk Co. Perry was a fruit farmer. He had fruit trees, strawberries, grapes, blackberries and raspberries in addition to a 25 acre apple orchard. He sold his produce to the markets in Des Moines. During apple season many families drove from Des Moines to buy apples and enjoy the free cider. He kept bees, chickens, and had cows for milk, butter and meat, but he would not allow a pig on the place. He said they were filthy and tended to look down on neighbors who kept hogs.

He was an expert with the bow and arrow and enjoyed demonstrating his skill to the grandchildren, telling them he had Indian blood and his Indian name was Chief Keen-Eye.

Perry was very particular about his clothes. He would not wear colored work shirts, and wore only white shirts, as the daughters well remembered who had to wash, starch and iron the white shirts with their detachable collars.

There was a happy family as the children grew up. The older daughters played the organ and daily devotions and much hymn singing was a part of their life. Perry and Nancy Ellen were members of the United Brethren Church, and had been baptized in the river as was their custom.

The family was saddened by the death of the oldest two daughters. They had helped care for an elderly neighbor who had tuberculosis, and both contracted the disease and died in 1892. Her mother, Nancy Ellen, contracted tuberculosis caring for her daughters, and she died ten years later after a long illness.

William Perry Keeney died at his home on May 6, 1938, aged 94 years, 7 months, and 27 days. He was laid to rest in the Avon Cemetery where he is surrounded by many Keeneys, including his grandfather, Rev. Jonathan Anthony Keeney, one of the first to be buried there in 1850.

KEENEY, ASHBEL W20, 300 Enlisted at E. Hartford Ct. as Ct., as a Pvt. 1776, died 7 Jan 1825 Manchester, Ct. (formerly part of E.Hartford). Application made by Daniel Winslow, conservator of the widow Sarah Keeney who was deranged. She was allowed pension in 1840, living in Manchester, age 73 years, had a family of children, son Ashbel age 55 yrs in 1840. Ashbel Keeney had s. Sarah Hills in the winter of 1784 by Pastor Eliphalet Williams of the Congregational Church of E. Hartford.

Testimony of Richard Keeney of Manchester, age 74, who served in the later part of the Revolution and received a pension. "There served with me in part of my tours Jeremiah Keney, a cousin, and after the close of the war he courted Miss Sarah Hills of E. Hartford. He raised his house and the evening after at a wrestling ring received a severe strain and a blood vessel was broken and he died two days later and was buried the 8th of July 1763, funeral by Rev. Benajah Phelps of Manchester. A few months after his death Ashbel Keeney married Sarah Hills, and lived with her until his death 17 years ago. The widow remained unmarried. I myself was married in Sept. 1785. When I was married Ashbel's wife had one child." Signed by Richard X Keeney (his mark) 26 August 1840.

KEENEY, ETHEL R5813 Probate Dist. New Haven, Ct. 3 Aug. 1832. Resident of the town of Derby, age 77. Enlisted spring of 1776, then living in Derby. In Sept. 1777 then residing in Bethlehem in Litchfield Co., he went with Sheldon Clark of Southbury (then Woodbury). Ezekiel Lewis of Bethlehem was Adjutant under Capt. Hawley. Enlisted Oct. 1776 from Derby, home to Derby in May 1777, June 1777 under Joseph Hull. He was born on 17 March 1755, a record which remains in his father's Bible. He always resided in Derby except about one or two years in Bethlehem. Depositions of Eleaser Green and William Keeney. "I, William Keeney of Derby in New Haven, Ct. I was born and always lived in Derby, brother of Ethel Keeney. I myself was in the service near him." 3 Aug. 1832 signed William Keeney.

KEENEY, JAMES W20,326 Application made by Anna Keeney, widow, age 73, resident of town of Courtland, Courtland Co., NY 8 March 1837. She married James Keeney 25 Oct. 1781 by Rev. James Ellis of Glastonbury, Ct. He died 19 Sept. 1821 in Conn. Disposition of Prudence Fox her sister age 75 yrs. of Amity Twp., Erie Co. Pa. James Keeney enlisted from E. Hartford, Ct. in 1782. Her sister's first child had been born by then, named Eleazar Kinney. Deposition made Jan. 1838. Samuel Fox also made a deposition. 28 Aug. 1837, deposition of Luther Nichols age 55 yrs of Courtland, NY, son-in-law of James and Anna Kinney. "She has lived with me ever since decease of James 19th Sept. 1821. He lived with me 12 years before his death." Deposition of Reuben Risley 28 Aug. 1837 Courtland, NY, age 69 next Jan., that she was Anne Brooks in 1781 and lived next to his when he was drafted. Deposition of Sarah Hill, sister of Anna, age 65 of town of Truxton, in Courtland Co., NY, that she was at the marriage of James Kinney who lived in East Hartford. Included is a copy of the marriage record sworn to on 19 May 1837 a true copy Church of Christ in Eastbury, by Rev. James Ellis; 25 Oct. 1781 James Keeney and Anna Brooks were married.

KEENEY, RICHARD S13,620 Application made 12 Aug. 1852 by John W. Keeney of Manchester, Ct., son of Richard late a soldier. Earlier deposition of Margaret Keeney of Manchester, Ct. 11 March 1832, age 69 yrs, b. 11 March 1763, m. Sept 1784 to Richard Keeney of Manchester. "He was 2 years and 4 months younger than I. b. 22 July 1765. We were born and always resided in the same town. He went as a substitute for his father, his uncle and one Silas Hills, when a mere lad. My brother Moses Porter served. He now lives in Bristol, NY. My oldest brother David Porter enlisted. Third bro., Eliphalet Porter lived in New Hartford and died there." Deposition of Richard Keeney of Manchester, Ct. age 65, 18 July 1832. Enlisted in E. Hartford, now called Manchester, returned to Glastonbury in 1792. He was born in E. Hartford 22 July 1767, age recorded in the books of the Methodist Circuit kept by Esquire Bliss of Wilbraham. He was a resident of E. Hartford since the day

daughter of Landon Taylor Keeney (1848-1924), who was pictured in UPDATE Vol. II, No. 3; lived in South Dakota after her marriage in Iowa.

KEENEY, THOMAS S9366 Application by Thomas Keeney, 11 Sept. 1832, of Fabius, Onondaga Co., NY, that he entered service at E. Hartford, Ct. and served 1775-1778. He was b. 10 May 1751 (o.s.) at E. Hartford, Ct., moved April 1781 to Wyoming, PA, moved his family there in August. Letters mention that his will was dated 9 June 1806 and that he died in 1840.

KEENEY, WILLIAM S18,072 Application made by William Keeney of Derby, Ct. 3 Aug. 1832. He was b. 16 July 1757 in Derby and enlisted in Derby. - Abstracted by Gwen B. Bjorkman Bellevue, WA - June 1986

QUERY

Searching for marriage record, or any information concerning Thomas Keeney who married Nancy Fugate, probably in eastern Tennessee or Kentucky in the very early 1800's. Their oldest child, Martha, born 11 Jan. 1806.

Thomas Keeney was a traveling Baptist preacher who attended camp meetings, preached in various churches all of his life tho I have found no record of his ordination as a minister.

The family were in Indiana circa 1814-1820 and then moved to Saline Co. Missouri. They were later in Henry County where it appears that Nancy died in the early 1830's.

No record has been found in Missouri of the marriage of Thomas Keeney to Lavinia _____, but when he died in Holt County, Missouri in 1846 his wife Lavinia settled his estate and listed seven daughters as heirs.

(a) Thomas Keeney Nancy Fugate Lavinia

BACKGROUND

My grandmother, Martha Mulholland Miller, was born in Oregon Territory in 1852. As she was growing up in Oregon she spent a great deal of time with her grandmother, Martha (Patsy) Keeney Mulholland and then, as I grew up I heard a great many Oregon pioneer stories and spent a great deal of time with my grandmother. When I was in high school I began to take notes... write something of a biography of my grandmother, of her family and of the Millers. She corrected this original manuscript and I made more notes. But I did not ask all of the questions that I should have asked... it was not until later, until my children were almost grown that I really became interested in genealogy and wanted proof of the things that I had been told. Grandmother died in 1949.

Martha (Patsy) Keeney was the oldest daughter of Thomas Keeney and Nancy Fugate. One of her first memories was riding behind her father and going to camp meetings where he preached in either Tennessee or Kentucky... was a trail through the forest, usually, and she was afraid, but hung on, with her arms around her father's arm. She had younger sisters at home with their mother, she got to go with her father. (I was intrigued with a story as a little girl. My grandmother would quote "annie" (her grandmother) and it was very real. But if I actually knew the exact locations of these expeditions and I do not think that she did.) I did not find out. There were many stories, but nothing about Lavinia... nothing pertinent to my later search except that I have written:

"Of Thomas Keeney and Nancy Fugates four girls, Polly was the youngest. Polly's husband, Torbert Kelly had died before the family came to Oregon. My father met them at THE Dalles and for a time the family lived with us and then moved up to a farm of their own. The children (Kellys) were Nancy, Elias, Tom, Becky Jane and Torbert... Tom drowned, crossing the Coast Fork...

Donovan Keeney was a son of Oscar D. & Maude Griffith Keeney, grandson of Samuel Keeney, of Cabin Creek, WV (4.42,p.70). Mary Keeney was the wife of Averel Keeney (6.272,p.70), Boone Co., WV and was the former Mary Ellen Lange. Letha Keeney Bupp was the last surviving child of the Rev. T. Y. Keeney (5.114, p. 55) and her family was recently listed in KEENEY UPDATE. Helen Keeney Hollins, daughter of Geo. Washington Keeney & Maggie Dundas (6.199, p.52) provided much material for KEENEY RELATIVES.

CHARLES KEENEY DEAD

Young Marine killed in action in Second Battle of Iwo Jima.

Word was received here last evening that Mrs. Jennie Keeney of Ross, Va., had received word from the Army Department at Washington to the effect that her son, Charles H. Keeney, had been killed in action on June 11 in the battle of the Marce.

Young Keeney was a member of the machine gun company of his regiment and had enlisted in the Marine Corps in July, 1957, when he was 18 years of age. He arrived in Hawaii in the first year and had seen considerable service since that time as various units in France. It is stated that this is the first death reported of any West Virginian soldier and marks the first gulf war in the service gun of that war.

History of the Keeney Family From 1630

The first ancestor of the Keeney family that we have any record of was William Keeney (Nate the 1st).

From Babson's History of Gloucester, Mass., we read his name among those who were known to have been residents of Gloucester, Mass., or holders of the soil from the time of its present settlement to 1650. We also found that Gloucester was settled in 1633, but did not become a town until 1642. Also that William Keeney had a house and land which he sold to Thomas Prince in 1625. He had a daughter who married Ralph Parkin. From another history found of New London, Conn., we saw where William Keeney of Gloucester, Mass., came with a party of friends to make arrangements for receiving Mr. Richard Blinman, who had been the minister of Gloucester for eight years and was now engaged to begin the ministry of the Pequot Plantation.

They belonged to what was called the Cape Ann party and took up a great lot of land at New London, October 16, 1650. These lots, nine in number of six acres each, extending each side of the narrow street from the Alder swamp in front to the Cedar Swamp on the west.

Early in 1651 a new street in the rear of the town plot was opened up, and took the name of Cape Ann Lane; now called Ann Street.

The lot of William Keeney was nearly opposite to the south entrance of the new street on the Niantic Road. It is stated that William Keeney was Deputy in 1662, and we were lead to believe that he came from England to Plymouth with Mr. Blinman.

William Keeney died in New London in 1675 and we will try and follow his lineage down until the present.

These are the children who first started what is now known as the Keeney Reunion. We have also traced back a bit into the history of Amanda Mallory family. Dr. Zalmon Mallory, father of Amanda, was born Feb. 10, 1784, in Montgomery, Hampshire County, Mass., and died in Morenci, Lenawee County, Mich., Feb. 15, 1841, aged 57. He was reared a farmer, but studied medicine after he was 21, and became a very successful physician for several years, but after coming to Michigan he practiced exclusively. He married Anna Gould, July 10, 1811. She was born in East Haddam, Conn., March 4, 1780. She was the daughter of Joseph and Mary Gould. After their marriage they moved to Royal, Hampshire County, Mass. Five children were born there: (1) Mary Ann (m) George Miles; (2) Sophia (m) Silas Russ; (3) Alanson (m) Angeline—after Alanson's death she remarried to a man named Beaz;

one child that died young; Amanda (b) March 27, 1822; (m) Jonathan Bishop Keeney (b) March 15, 1815, (m) Mary J. 1839. Dr. Zalmon Mallory brought his little family to Michigan in 1836. He drove a covered wagon and Anna Gould Mallory drove a one-horse "Democrat" wagon. Amanda was always a sickly child, and at the age of 14 weighed but 75 pounds. It was at this time that they came to Mich.

Our great grandfather, Joseph Keeney, was a farmer until he married Mary Bishop. He then went into the mercantile business. In 1817 they moved to Leroy, N. Y. When Jonathan Bishop was two years old, at Leroy, Joseph bought a farm which he worked until his death in 1842. Mary Bishop, the wife of Joseph, was born in New Lynn, Conn., 1781, and died at Leroy, N. Y., in 1877, aged 96. Jonathan lived at home until he was 20. He then went to Franklin, Lenawee County, Mich., where he bought up land on section 21 and 22. After he had been in Michigan four years he married to Amanda Mallory. They lived at Franklin until 1849, when he sold his farm at his brother, John Keeney. On this farm he had two sons and three daughters. They then bought up 160 acres in Cambridge, Lenawee County, Mich., and lived there until the death of his dear wife, our mother and grandmother. This occurred Feb. 9, 1855, while she was at the home of her son, John William, who lived in South Rily, Clinton County, N. Y. She was 92 years of age. On the farm at Cambridge were born seven sons and one daughter. This farm was called one of the best in the county. The house was of brick, standing above the road and enclosed by a stone wall. At this time was a many a Thanksgiving dinner was enjoyed, and at no time was anyone turned away. Different sons worked the farm but at last it was sold to Arthur White. Father Keeney made his home with his son, Alanson, in Adrian, Mich., where he died April 30, 1897, aged 83. Both he and his wife were buried in the Cambridge cemetery, near the church where our mother and grandmother was superintendent of the Sunday school for so many years up until the time of her death. Father Keeney was a whig and later became a republican. As for religion he was a Baptist as were his father and mother. Mother Keeney was an Episcopalian and probably would have been a republican could she have voted.

This is the history traced as far as it could be found and also the family tree up to date.

HISTORY OF NORTH IDAHO.

ELIJAH N. KEENEY is one of the principal owners of the town site of Eugene, which post-office is known as Gifford. He has always been public spirited and generous for the upbuilding of the town and surrounding country. He has donated lots to several worthy purposes and is always on the progressive side of things.

Elijah N. Keeney was born in Eugene, Oregon, on November 12, 1866, being the son of Jonathan and Margaret S. (Mitchell) Keeney. When our subject was ten, the father went to Colfax, Washington, and his sons joined him three years later. The mother died April 14, 1899. Elijah worked in the planing mill business in Colfax for eight years and in 1892, went to Valpo, California, where he labored for three years as an undertaker for Henry Connolly. In August, 1895, he returned to Colfax, and here came to the reservation, securing the claim where he now lives. He built a primitive log cabin and for a long time it was used for the meeting place of the settlers. He has improved his place in excellent shape and raises the cereals, handles stock and has some registered specimens. A portion of his land has been sold for the town site of Eugene and many have purchased lots from him. Mr. Keeney has three brothers, Elmer M., George F., and John J., the last two living in the vicinity of Roseland, Washington, and the former in Whitman county. He has one sister, Martha J., wife of Joseph Cherry of Roseland, Washington.

(On May 21, 1900, Mr. Keeney married Miss Eugenia, daughter of John and Catherine M. (Thiele) Allen, natives respectively of Arkansas and Missouri. They reside near Drew, Oregon, having the best of the plans in 1852. Mrs. Keeney's ancestors on her mother's side came from Germany and her paternal ancestors from Tennessee. She has four brothers and one sister, Robert L., Frederick A., Murry M., Ceed H., all in Oregon. The sister, Mrs. Susie E. Hanson, lives near our subject. Mr. Keeney has a membership in the M. W. A. and is a member of the lodge. He is clerk of Stearns Camp, M. W. A., 6988, at Eugene until it disbanded. In politics he is independent. To Mr. and Mrs. Keeney there has been born one child, Hester W. Mr. Keeney's grandparents crossed the plains with ox carts in 1852, the maternal grandfather being from Maine and the paternal grandfather from Connecticut. Mr. Keeney has served as school director and has been active in the advancement of the cause of education as well as for the general progress and he has universally shown himself a man of mature judgment and keen wisdom, while his integrity and earnest worth is never questioned.

Keeney sitting as boss of pen

Saying that he is not happy with

what's going on in the state of Oregon, J. C. Keeney will publicly announce today his resignation as superintendent of the Oregon State Penitentiary, the Statesman-Journal has learned.

Keeney, who J. C. Keeney was named superintendent in September 1984, capping a 24-year climb up Oregon's prison brasserie, said he is leaving Aug. 1 to become operations officer with the Arizona Corrections Division.

In that capacity, he said, he will supervise care and security for more than 4,000 inmates in Arizona's rapidly growing prison system.

Keeney, 51, said the new job was too good to pass up, as he will draw a full pension from the state of Oregon in addition to \$12 salary from Arizona. He has a paid more than \$50,000 a year.

Keeney would not say whether his pension or salary would be under the new arrangement.

Despite the pay incentive, Keeney said it was Oregon's seemingly insur-

able prison crowding problem that prompted him to look elsewhere in the first place.

"We've been overcrowded for 10 years and nobody is doing anything about it," he said.

He said the overwhelming defeat May 20 of a state prison bond issue was just the most recent in a series of such setbacks.

In contrast, he said, Arizona has three new penal facilities under construction.

Keeney's boss, Corrections Division chief Tom Toombs, could not be reached Thursday night.

Leo Hagstrom, head of the parent Human Resources Department, said he was aware of Keeney's plans and sympathetic with the reasoning behind them.

"It's frustrating for those prison superintendents who every day are fighting for space," he said.

Keeney began his career in 1960 as recreation director at the Oregon State Correctional Institution. He was transferred to the penitentiary in 1969 as head of rehabilitation programs.

Keeney served as second-in-command under Hoyt Cook, long-time superintendent of the penitentiary, for 10 years before advancing to the top job two years ago.

Each will be identified as "THE BOOK OF MICHAEL", "THE BOOK OF MOSES", "THE BOOK OF MARY", etc. and numbering will begin with each "BOOK".

My way of sharing these records with all of you is to print all of my research. I am just starting on the manuscript and have eased up on the research and correspondence. The majority of my time is now being spent working towards a print date objective. I am reluctant to give an approximate date, possibly within 2 years, and hopefully sooner barring any further unexpected interruptions. Many older records and data will be included making it interesting and more than just a book of names, dates and places. The most prominent states covered are: VA, KY, IN, IA, KS, MO, AR, TX, OK, OR & WA.
