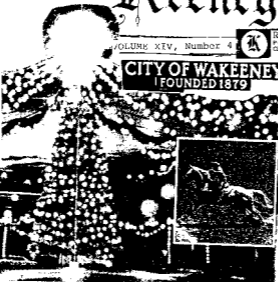


Keeney Update

James Lee Keeney

James Lee Keeney, 69, Englewood, died Nov. 7, 1997.

He was born Nov. 14, 1927, in Summerville, W.Va., and came to Englewood seven years ago from Georgia. He was a professor of education and psychology for the University System of Georgia. He received a bachelor's degree from Glennville State College in 1948, a master's degree from the University of Tennessee in 1956 and a doctorate in education from the University of Tennessee in 1958. An Air Force veteran, he served in the Korean War. He was an Episcopalian. He was a past president of the Lions Club and the Cochran Rotary Club and a scoutmaster for Boy Scout Troop 53.

Survivors include a daughter, Ann of Aspen, Colo.; a son, Randall of Winston-Salem, N.C.; a sister, Thelma Teraham of Reno, Nev.; two brothers, Herbert A. and Jerry F. of Venice; and two grandchildren.

Visitation will be from 2 to 4 and 6 to 8 p.m. today at Roberts Brothers Universal Memorial Center. The service will be at 2 p.m. Tuesday at St. Marks Episcopal Church in

In 1877, James F. Keeney, of Chicago, purchased land, in what is now Trego County for speculative purposes, looking for wealth in the "Great American Desert." A deed was made from the Kansas Pacific Railway Company, to James F. Keeney, December 14, 1877, for all of Sec. 9, Township 12, R. 23—with other lands—for a consideration of \$27,732.21. Interested with Frank Keeney—as he was called as A. S. Warren—who built what is now the Hixson residence.

Among a number who came with them from Chicago, were two of Mr. Keeney's brothers; John Keeney homesteaded where Mr. Saleen now lives. Charles Keeney ran the Oakes House—named after Oakes Ames, president of the U.P.R.R. Co.

The Keeney brothers were sons of Charles William (1807TN-1875IA) and Mary Anna (Polly) Beck Keeney (1809-1886) and grandsons of Jonathan Anthony Keeney.

ABRAHAM KEENEY DESCENDENTS LOCATED THROUGHOUT ARKANSAS, OKLAHOMA, TEXAS

The territory of Missouri, in the middle of the Louisiana Purchase, applied for statehood in 1818, but was not admitted until late 1820 as a slave state. The first state wide census was the 1830 census.

Keeneys recorded in the 1830 census included Jack & Michael, St. Charles; John, Joseph and Thomas, Ray; Hardy (son of Michael), Gasconade; Thomas, Saline; and Abraham & Richard, Cooper County. Most of these families have been previously identified in KEENEY UPDATE. Inquiries from at least four states concerning Abraham's place in the family have prompted five years of intense research, which will be shared here in the hope that it will answer some questions and, at the same time, promote research.

Lest someone get confused, another ABRAHAM KEENEY (b.1818 in Fayette Co., IN, d.25 May 1843 in Holt Co., MO) was listed earlier as the sixth child of John Jr. & Mary Buckhalter Keeney.

ABRAHAM KEENEY OF COOPER COUNTY, MO.

Researchers believe that Peter Keeney (VA/KY) was the father of our subject and that Abraham was born in western Virginia in the 1770s. On

April 15, 1799 brothers Abraham and Michael Keeney witnessed a land survey of 100 acres for for Moses Keeney, in Lincoln Co., KY, joining Pitman's Creek. Within a few years Abraham, Michael, their brother Jesse and sister Elizabeth (m. Lewis Singleston in KY 1805) became settlers of central Missouri.

Land claims in the Missouri Territory list a claim by Richard Jones Waters and John Reed, assigns for Abraham Keeney, claiming 900 arpents of land, on waters of bayou St. Thomas, district of New Madrid, was presented 10 Feb 1806; the plot had been cultivated from 1801 to 1806; he had a wife and one child. It was the opinion of the Board that the claim be granted.

Abraham Keeney was married to Deborah Bowlin (Bolin), born in the 1780s and age 40-50 in the 1830 census. Abraham and Deborah became members of the Bethel Baptist Church at Cape Girardeau in 1813. The Gilgal Baptist Church of Miller Co. lists both as members in 1842, along with family members Jacob, James and Modest. The Intelligence of New Madrid Co. lists Abraham

as resident 1821-26.

The 1830 census of Cooper County, MO lists Abraham at age 50-60 and Deborah age 40-50. Six children, including two sons, are still at home. This is an incomplete list:

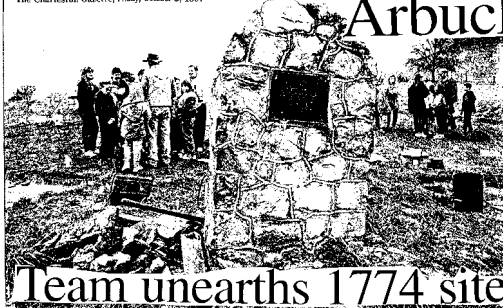

Team unearths 1774 site

ALDERSON — This week, archeologists and a small army of volunteers located the remains of the stockade wall that surrounded Arbuckle's Fort, built in the spring of 1774 to protect colonial settlers in the Muddy Creek area of Greenbrier County from Indian raiders.

"We're surprised at how big it is," said Kim Meltrick, the University of Kentucky archeologist and Greenbrier County native who is coordinating the dig. "It really took a lot of work. It's 120 feet by a side, and includes two bastion towers and two gates."

The diamond-shaped fort, located on a bluff overlooking the confluence of Muddy Creek and Mill Creek, about two miles north of Alderson, was ordered built by Capt. Matthew Arbuckle of the

Ohio. The Shawnee and Mingo under Chief Cornstalk had other ideas, and attacked Lewis' band, only to meet defeat.

Thirty four forts and less elaborate blockhouses were built in the Greenbrier and New River valleys during the latter 1700s, said Meltrick, who has been studying frontier stockade life in the nation with her husband, Stephen, also an archeologist and a Greenbrier County native, for 10 years.

The Meltricks directed a preliminary excavation of the Arbuckle's Fort site in 1992, which uncovered the remains of a two-room log cabin, a hearth and a food storage outfit, among other features.

After a five-year hiatus, the couple returned to the site last week to

Virginia Militia

Residents of about 30 farmsteads in the area made use of the fort when militia scouts making patrols through the frontier deflected attacks by warring Native Americans. A detachment of 15 to 20 militiamen is believed to have been stationed at the fort, which outlined its usefulness sometime in the late 1760s.

Colonial settlers first crossed the Alleghenies and moved into the Greenbrier Valley in the early 1760s. They were drawn out by Indians later in that decade, but re-

turned in the early 1760s, only to be hunted out again within a few years.

Among casualties recorded by the settlers were four or five members of farmsteads near the mouth of Muddy Creek who were killed or abducted by Indians in 1761.

Once the fort was built, gunfire was heard in the distance on several occasions, but there is no evidence that it was ever attacked. It merely served as a prominent area from which militiamen could make scouting trips deep into the frontier to monitor Indian or

British activities

By researching records of Arbuckle's Fort militiamen seeing Revolutionary War pensions for their service, "we found out the militia made use of a system of scouts who roamed around the frontier in three- or four-day patrols, looking for signs of Native American activity," Meltrick said.

"When they found some activity, they would sound up the people on the farmsteads and bring them into the fort."

Capt. Arbuckle and his men left the fort in September of 1774 to guide Col. Andrew Lewis and an army of militiamen up the Kanawha River to Point Pleasant, to rendezvous with Lord Dunmore, the colonial Virginia governor. From there, the Virginians planned to attack Native American settlements in present-day

"The bastion sits in opposition of the fort were probably situated to accommodate lookouts," the Meltricks say.

Inside the perimeter, clumps of metal findings found in an area that produced a multitude of metal detector hits suggests the remains of a blacksmithing site.

Among artifacts turned up so far during the current dig are fragments representing several different types of 18th century English pottery, worn gun flints, a German-made gun sight, a clay smoking pipe, several metal buttons and examples of 18th century glassware, and several "pieces of eight" — silver Spanish gold coins that had been cut into quarters and eighths to make change. While the coin segments are in good condition, they bear no dates.

The Meltricks will wrap up the current dig next week, but plan to return again next year.

Also in the works is an excavation of Cook's Fort near Greenville in Monroe County, which encompassed a 1.5-acre area inside its stockade walls, and provided shelter for up to 300 settlers, according to historic accounts.

The North House Museum in Lewisburg is displaying items unearthed at Arbuckle's fort, and will update the exhibit in the months to come.

WEST VIRGINIA

Muddy Creek was home to John Keeney and his family before and after the Indian Wars.

Various historical sources refer to the building of Keeney's Fort in the shadow of Keeney's Mt.

Alderson is located on the Greenbrier River, in both Monroe and Greenbrier counties. Muddy Creek is just north of Alderson, off WY Route 12.

To some Peter Keeneey is unconnected from his Virginia forebearers of the late 1700's. The one thing on which all agree is that he is the father of the Pulaski Co., KY Keeneey branch. Pulaski was formed from Green & Lincoln counties in 1799.

Another historical fact is that Peter Keeneey's life was intricately connected with the Yocum and See families, who moved from Hardy and Grant Cos. to the Greenbrier valley at the same time the Keeneeys were establishing their settlement there. In fact, Peter's closest cohort, Matthias Yocum, was married to Elinor See.

The name Yocum (Yokum) is likely the Americanization of the name Joachim. Victims of Europe's Hundred Years & Thirty Years Wars, the family immigrated into Berk's Co., PA, where Philip Powell Yocum worked with a group of surveyors connected with Lord Fairfax, who was surveying for George Washington. But some Yocums kept moving.

In 1738 the Yocum, See, Stump and Harness families moved to the South branch of the Potomac, settling on the West side of Mike's Ford, near the present town of Moorfield. Philip died in 1753.

Mary Margaret Judy (b.1690 in Switzerland, d.28 March 1757/8 in Hampshire Co.) married George Ludwig See (b.1685 in Prussia, d.1751 in Hardy Co.) about 1709. They were parents of 11 children, the third being Elinor See, who became the wife of Matthias Yocum. Two children of Matthias & Elinor were listed in Mary M. See's will, which was dated 28 Mar 1757 and proved 14 Feb 1758.

Under a 26 April 1745 order of the Council of VA, 100,000 acres on the Greenbrier River, west of the Cowpasture River, was made available to families who would settle and cultivate 1,000 acres or more. The council's offer was accepted by John Robinson,

Esq., James Wood, Henry Robinson, Thomas Lewis and Andrew Lewis on 1 June 1750, on the condition of "paying one shilling for each 50 acres, to be paid on the Feast of St. Michael the Archangel, on promise of cultivating and improving the land within three years". Among the first to apply were Keeneeys, Yocums, and Sees.

MASSACRES AND SETTLEMENTS

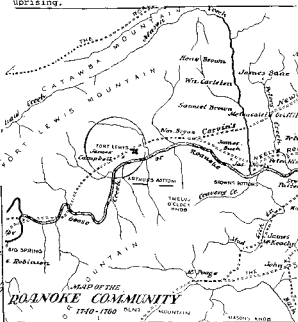
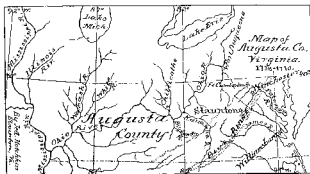
From 1738 to 1769 western Virginia was a part of Augusta County, a vast tract that comprised the area west of the Ohio was under Augusta jurisdiction until Illinois County was formed in 1778. In 1769 there was an Augusta/Hotcourt division, placing greenbrier settlers in Botetourt county during the 1770's. Thus it made it possible, in a period of hardly more than ten years, for residents to be listed in Augusta, Botetourt and Greenbrier counties without changing their residence.

While this area was a part of the vast Augusta region land from the 100,000 acre order was distributed, with some designations of great interest to those searching Keeneey history:

- Nov 22, 1750 - Felty Yocum - 480 acres
- Apr 22, 1751 - Frederick See - 480 acres
- Apr 24, 1751 - Matthias Yocum - 330 acres
- Apr 25, 1751 - John Keeneey, 40 acres, followed by an additional 375 acres
- May 1, 1751 - George See - 360 acres

Dr. Thomas Walker, returning to Greenbrier in 1750 from a venture into Kentucky, reported that several families had already taken residence in the river valley. Muddy Creek and Big Levels began as new settlements.

The French & Indian War broke out in 1754, continuing to 1761. The new Greenbrier settlers were not to be spared. In the fall of 1763 Chief Cornstalk and about 60 Shawnee warriors called on Muddy Creek. The newly constructed fort was dealt a death blow. Among those taken were Mrs. Walter Fishpaugh and her 5 children, a daughter of John Crouse, and a Mrs. F. Keeneey, Frederick See and Felty Yocum and their families were killed in the uprising.



Earlier, on 9 August 1755 Matthias Yocum had purchased 261 acres on the north side of Robin Oak, above Arthur's Bottom at Fort Lewis in the Roanoke

valley, paying 40 English pounds.

Service records of the French & Indian War, listed in Kegley's Virginia Frontier, list John Keeney as a member of Dickinson's Company of Rangers in 1756 & 1757.

Botetourt Co., VA tax records for 1770-77 list Matthias Yocum as a land taxpayer in District 7 in 1770 & 1771. John Keeney is listed ten times and Michael Keeney 4 times in the same period. Payments did not come easy, however; on 18 Nov 1782 the names of John and Michael Keeney were on a petition for tax relief in the land payments.

Obviously the surviving Keeneys, as well as other families, returned to their lands by 1773, but only after the Battle of Point Pleasant in 1774 did they feel safe from further raids. The army of Gen. Lewis had hacked out a trail down the Kanawha Valley, which became a wagon road in 1783.

KEENEY FAMILY SCATTERS

The oldest of John Keeney's sons was 20 years old in 1770, according to an unpublished Montgomery family history (Nancy Keeney Montgomery was a granddaughter of John Keeney). He had seven sons and, undoubtedly, some daughters. Rev. John Alderson, a Baptist circuit rider who was a contemporary of John Keeney, preached to the settlers at Muddy Creek and is listed as the founder of the 215 yr. old Greenbrier Baptist Church in Alderson. Alderson baptized many, including Catherine, the wife of John Keeney.

During the American Revolution son Jonathan Keeney was a soldier (later getting a grant of land in Tennessee) and brothers Michael, Thomas (who went to Missouri) and David furnished supplies. Michael and his brother Moses (great great grandfather of the writer) agreed to "maintain their parents" who deeded the home place to them. In 1789 Father John was granted another 115 acres which he and Catherine sold in 1795. Earlier, on 20 June 1791 the Greenbrier County Court record showed, "John Keeney is discharged from paying county and parish levies on account of old age and infirmities".

Meanwhile, Michael (1761-1791), whose vast family later spread to Ohio, Kentucky, and Iowa, as well as West Virginia, built a three-section log house at Muddy Creek, with rock chimneys and a small stairway. After his death from pneumonia, a section of the house was moved to nearby Blakers Run and was used as a residence before becoming a place for the storage of hay. The ALDERSON NEWS, a local newspaper, identified this remnant as the Keeney Cabin many years later.

PETER KEENEY AND KENTUCKY

Meanwhile, what happened to Peter Keeney? Plenty. The most complete store of the mid 1700's was operated at Fort Lewis by Alexander Boyd for the Virginia Regiment. He died in 1766 and his entire in-

ventory was taken over by Alexander Baines. Baines extended credit to trusted customers.

In the Henry Innes Papers from the Manuscript Division of the Library of Congress, two of these trusted customers are listed with a dozen others:

2. Catherine Yocum, lived near Fort Lewis, married to C. Garic, interest from 1775 till paid - owes 2 pounds, 16 shillings, 5 pence;
3. Peter Keeney, a blacksmith, lived at Fort Lewis, now lives at Lincoln, Ky near Harrods (or Harrods) - 2 pounds, 10 shillings, 5 pence.

Before 1776 Kentucky was known on the Virginia map as Fincastle County. In 1780 it was split into three counties - Jefferson, Fayette and Lincoln. It was at this time that Daniel Boone established Boonesboro and almost simultaneously both Matthias Yocum and Peter Keeney became Lincoln county residents.

Kentucky was admitted to the union on June 1, 1792. Jefferson and Fayette counties became eight counties, including Mercer. Peter Keeney's name was on a 1789 Mercer Co., KY tax list. This was the result of a 1782 grant for land in Fayette Co., KY, the grant being registered in Botetourt County. It is plain that Peter Keeney had left Virginia, but his association with Matthias Yocum was short lived after that Peter was a witness to the 1780 will of Matthias Yocum in 1786 drawn up in Botetourt Co. and probated in 1783 in Lincoln County. A property transfer, dated April 15, 1799 identifies the Peter Keeney property line on Pitman's Creek and was notarized by Abraham and Michael Keeney.

Blanche Keeney Stephens, Keeney historian, genealogist and author, is a direct descendant of Peter Keeney and has plans to publish his biography and family line, which includes these children:

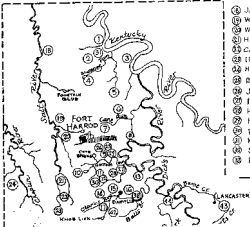

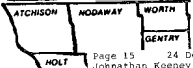
