KENNEYS OF AUGUSTA VA AND BOURBON KY HAD IRISH HERITAGE

There was a time that the writer was offended when introduced as Kenney or when the Keeney name was "misspelled" or "mispronounced".

That was before years of intensive research, resulting in the discovery that years before they came to America, Kenneys, Kinnes, Kinneys and Keenes were abundant in England, Scotland, Ireland and in almost all early American colonies.

Actually (you may prove me wrong) the name of KEENEY emerged from the other spellings and became the "accepted" spelling first in the New London CT area. These Keeneys were descendents of Sir Thomas Kine (1603 Norfolk, England) John Kinne (1670 Salem MA) and Henry Keny (born in Holland to Puritan family, came to MA).

In recent years the writer has been aware of the KEENEYS of the Greenbrier VA/WV area, almost next door to the host of KENNEYS in Augusta VA. Before the Keeneys spread out to TN and KY, thence to IN, MO, IA and Oregon, the Augusta Kenneys were populating Bourbon, Scott and Fayette Counties in KY. Almost simultaneously the Peter KEENEY family was expanding in Lincoln, Mercer and what became Pulaski Co KY.

JOHN KEENEY and his (probable) wife Annie Poets were progenitors of the KEENEYS, while apparently ROBERT KENNEY, native of Ireland, emigrated to Allegheny County PA, then settling in Augusta Co, of which Greenbrier Co was part before 1780. Robert's wife was Phoebe Huston and one son was William, the father of the first Matthew Kenney.

MATTHEW KENNEY Augusta Co VA records mention Matthew Kenney frequently and state that he took his family to Fayette Co KY in 1796. He was married in Augusta 3 Oct 1770. One source gives her name as Anna Caldwell Smith; Matthew's will was recorded 16 Jan 1818 in Fayette Co. County records list these children: Rebecca (Givens) 7-17-1771, James 1-5-1774, Matthew 1-22-1776, Agnes 3-12-1778 (died young), Elizabeth (Montgomery) 12 Nov 1750, Agnes McCreary (Lyle) 1-22-1783, Sarah 1-22-1785, Robert P 1-22-1787 (wife Sally d.5-15-1856), Alexander Robertson 1-1-1790, d.12-12-1844, and Mary Huston 1792. Other descendents of William : Keeney William Lowery and J Smith Keeney. William, a doctor, was the father of Charles Alexander Kenney (m.Pauline Pullex in 1880), native of Millersburg and Largest breeder of birds, horses and sheep in America. Charles' son Frank F Kenney was Asst. Secretary of KY Trotting Horse Breeders, later becoming secretary of Montana Racing Assn. at Butte, and then spending ten years with Chicago Horse Sales. Dr. William Kenney Jr, graduate of KY School of Medicine in Louisvillr, married Maud Shacklford of Mercer Co and served as president of the Bourbon County Medical Association. JAMES BARNETT KENNEY

JAMES BARNET I KENNEY James Barnett Kenney was born in 1726 in Ireland and died at the age of 56 in Uniontown, Fayette Co PA. He served as a Sgt in the 11th Pennsylvania Regiment during the Revolution, where three of his sons served and son Joseph gave his life. DAR records list his birth as 1720 and his death as 1786. He married twice: (1) a Ms. Kramer and (2) Mary, born 14 May 1747.



In the History of Bourbon County James Keeney is listed among the first to raise corn there (in 1775). From his will we see his wife Peggy, sons John, Victor, Joseph and Napoleon and daughters Maria, Abbe, Helena, Cordee and Peggy as well as daughters Sally Barnett, Elizabeth Trotter, Polly Hildreth and Nancy Rhodes.

James first married Mary FRAME (1747-1798). Yhey were parents of Moses 1784-1875, David 1772-1804, Elizabeth 1773, John C 1775-1847, Mary "Polly" 1779, James 1782-1813, Sally Barnett 1786 and Nancy 1788. On 17 June 1799 ne married Margaret (Peggy) Johnson (1770-1829) in Augusta Co VA and they were parents of Marie Louise 1800-1850, Abigail B 1801-1856 m. Levy Houston 8 Jan 1824 bur Kenney Cem, Paris KY, Helena L 1804-2849, Joseph Bonaparte 1806-1877, Napoleon Bonaparte 1808-1836, Charlotte Corday 1809-1897, Victor Mareau 1812-1877, Margaret (Peggy) 1813-1900 & Mary Ann 1814 in Bourbon, d.18 Apr 1830 at age 15 (on the day of her death she was wed to Diamed Barnett.

Moses Kenney moved to Illinois where he was founder of the town KENNEY along with his brother John in honor of their father James. Kenney began "to grow like a weed" and became one of the most widely known small towns in the state. Moses married Catherine Stogsdill (1807-1861) and became father to John Muir, George M 1826, William 1828, Jefferson 1831, Elizabeth 1832 and Susan M 1832.

David Kenney, eldest son, was born in VA and died about 1804, leaving hiswife Martha Rocke and infant children Polly & Elizabeth.

Elizabeth Kenney, born in VA, came to KY with her parents and married James Trotter, with whom she moved to Illinois. Born in KY were Joseph Trotter 1797, James 1799, John 1800, Mary 1802, Nancy 1805, Jane 1807 and George 1809. Elizabeth was born in 1812 in Sagamon, Illinois.

JOHN C KEENEY 1775-1847 DIED IN Hannibal MO at age 71. Called Captain, John went with his second wife to MO about 1820 With first wife Mary Polly Johnson he fathered William Kenney, 1801-1876 Nicholas Ci KY farmer, Nancy w/o William Hicklin 1802-1882, Isaac 1807-1896, James, Moses, Jonas, Nocholas, Edith, Mary and Jack. In his second marriage he was the father of Fountain Kenney b.1809.

JAMES KENNEY JR b.1782 in Bourbon KY, d.30 Jan 1813 at Fort Defiance OH, where he was a Private in the KY Mounted Volunteer Militia. He m. Edy Johnson 3 Apr 1801and yhey lived in Green Creek. Children included Dosica, Eli, Polly, Archobald, Eda, James Madison

By Edward putnam and Henery Keney Yeoman both of Salem Village, Against Martha Cory the wife of Giles Cory of Salem farmes for Suspition of haveing Comitted sundry acts of Witchcraft and thereby donne much hurt and injury unto the Bodys of Ann Putnam the wife of Thomas putnam of Salem Village Yeoman And Anna Putnam the daughter of sd Thomas putnam and Marcy Lewis Single woman Liveing in sd putnams famyly; also abigail Williams one of mr parris his family and Elizabeth Hubert Doctor Grigs his maid---

You are therefore in theire Majests names hereby required to apprehend and bring; before us. Martha Cory the wife of Giles Cory abovesaid on Munday next being the. 21t day of this Instant month, at the house: of Lt Nathaniell Ingersalls of Salem Village aboute twelve of the Clock in ye day in order to her Examination Relateing to the premises and hereof you are not to faile Dated Salem March. the 19th 1691/2

NANCY KENNEY m. Lt Jonas Rhodes in Bzth Co KY and was mother of Nancy Menefee 1816-1886; shem. (2) Isham Revis in Greenville IL and they had a son Jonas McDonald Revis.

SALLY KENNEY m. John Barnett 1781-1854 in Augusta Co VA. He was a veteran of the War of 1812, fought with Andrew Jackson at the Battle of New Oeleans and was a volunteer in the Black Hawk War. They had nine children born in Bourbon County KY.

MARIE LOUISE KENNEY w/o May Joy Robinett was the 11th child of James. She was married 11 July 1816 and was the mother of Catherine O, James M & Margaret Robinett.

HELENA KENNEY 1804-1849 m. John Johnson 17800-1858 on 15 Sept 1822 in Fayette Co KY. Their children were Dewitt C 31 Jul 1828, Margaret 1832-1913, Victor M 1833 & Laura 1834 (died as infants) and Anna 1840 (m.George W Bain).

JOSEPH BONAPARTE KENNEY 1806-1887 married Lavinia Lander 8 Mar 1827 and purchased 360 acres in adjoining Scott Co KY; the farm grew to 1400 acres and included slaves, about forty of whom were set free upon Lincoln's famous Proclamation. He was a successful hog farmer, but in 1858 he moved to George-Town KY to cooperate with the pastor of the Presbyterian church in establishing a female seminary. A pillar in the church, he was father of ten children. Son James H m. Eleanor W Graves, Margaret m. B C Glass Esq, Sallie F m. Joseph Force Esq, Joseph F m. Mollie Thomas, Napolen B II m. Lizzie Rankin, Charles V m. Mollie Grissom, Alice m. Hon, S M Davis and Victor M m. Agnes Warren

Child #15 was CHARLOTTE CORDAY 1809-1897, the wife of David Leer 1803-1885, who built identical homes for four sons. Wealthy and vain, Leer would drink only from a china cup and a silver spoon. Living throughout their marriage on Jacksontown Pike, they were parents of Margaret 1831-1835, Elizabeth 1833-1918, Charles Carroll 1835-1922, Catherine 1840-1873 and James Monroe 1841-1894.

Child #16 was VICTOR MAREAU KENNEY b.1812 in Paris Ky, d. 30 Sept 1877, Kenney Cemetery, Stonerside Farm. He was a ruling elder and deacon in the Paris church for most of 44 years. He married Catherine Rogers 1812-1837 d/o Thomas & Rebecca Spahr Rogers. They had a daughter Rebecca 1835-1914.

MARGARET KENNEY 1813-1900 rounded out this large family. Born in Bourbon, she m.Isaac Johnson on 5 Mar 1836. They were parents of Maggie & Sarah Johnson (b.3 Aug 1877).

KING, SLYNN England

KEENE, SIR BENJAMIN (1697–1757 diplomatist, born at King's Lynn, Norfolk, in 1697, was eldest son of Charles Keene, merchant (alderman, and in 1714 mayor, of King's Lynn), who married Susan Rolfe. The family had long been resident at King's Lynn, and a Benjamin Keene (1631-1709) was its first mayor under the letters patent granted by Charles II. The younger Benjamin was educated at the Lynn free grammar school and at Pembroke Hall, Cambridge, where he graduated LL.B. in 1718. He is said to have been for some time at the university of Leyden, but his name does not appear in Peacock's list of its English students. His father's affairs became involved, but through the in-fluence of Sir Robert Walpole, who controlled the borough, he was appointed agent for the South Sea Company at Madrid, and in July 1724 was promoted to be British consul at that city. In September 1727, through the same influence, Keene received the higher post of minister plenipotentiary at Madrid, but was not until the close of the year publicly received in that capacity. The treaty of Seville, whereby a defensive alliance was concluded between England, Spain, and France, was arranged in November 1729 and younger brother of Sir Benjamin Keene [q. v.], was born at King's Lynn, Norfolk, in 1714. Through the influence of Sir Robert Walpole, the friend of the family, he was educated at Charterhouse School, and thence admitted at Caius College, Cambridge, in 1730. He graduated B.A. in January 1734, and M.A. in 1737, having been incorporated at Oxford on 14 July 1735. From Michaelmas 1730 to Lady day 1734 he was a scholar of Caius, and from Michaelmas 1736 to the same date in 1739 he was one of its junior fellows. In August 1739 he became a fellow of Peterhouse, Cambridge, and on 31 Dec. 1748 was promoted to be master of the college. For the two academical years ending November 1751 he acted as vice-chancellor

of the university, and busied himself in the work of reform. A code of 'orders and regulations," which was proposed to the senate on 11 May 1750, and subsequently became law, provoked an 'Occasional Letter to Dr. Keene, and many other productions. In 1743 the church was enlarged, if not improved, by the erection of two galleries, with a new pulpit and readingdesk. income of the benefice. On 22 March 1752 he was consecrated in Ely House Chapel as bishop of Chester, but he did not resign the mastership of his college until 1754. While at Chester he rebuilt the episcopal palace at a cost of 2,2007. George Grenville, in December 1764, proposed that he should accept a transfer to the archiepiscopal see of Armagh, but Keene replied that the diocese of Ely was the object of his ambition, and on 22 Jan. 1771 he had the good fortune to be confirmed as its bishop.

Keene was select preacher at Whitehall Chapel in 1738, and published five sermons. He was the author of a translation of the first idyll of Theocritus, 'by a Gentleman,' which is inserted in John Whaley's 'Poems' (1745), pp. 133-49. The original edition of Bentham's 'Ely' was dedicated to him, and to it was prefixed a plate of his arms. There is a portrait of him at Stanhope rectory.





The Rinehart Stone House

This attractive sandstone building, located on the Oregon Trail, was completed in 1872 for owners Amanda and Lewis B. Rinehart. They purchased the site from Jonathan Keeney who first settled the area and welcomed travelers to his small log dwelling located on the side of the Malheur River.

The Rinehart house was the first permanent building in the area and gave Vale its original name: Stone House. The Rinehart opened the Stone House on New Year's Day in 1873 with a Grand Ball. The upstairs ballroom soon became the desired location for weddings and

various social functions.

JOSEPH B. KEENEY. - The railroads have largely spoiled the big, old stage-line routes; but still a few of them remain. One of these is that between Pendleton and Heppner, Arlington, Fossil, and from The Dalles to Prineville. This route is conducted on the old style, and by a man fully up to the old-time requirements. This is Mr. Kenney. He was born in 1841, in Indiana, and came to California in 1852, and on a steamer which required sixty-six days from the Isthumus to San Francisco. In the spring of 1860 he went to Arizona and, with others, built Gila City. We now find him moving around rapidly, now in San José, now at Moroville, Nevada, and again at Alameda in California, variously in the hotel business, mining, and as deputy sheriff at the last place. In Nevada he began the peculiar but very accommodating business of driving over the country, taking orders for whatever the scattered ranchers needed, and filling them at Placerville; and upon such trips he frequently carried passengers. He subsequently conducted a stage line from Helena, Montana, to Fort Benton, following this by driving stage from Salt Lake to Provost, and on the road from Bear River Junction to Boise City.

Ezekiel Turner, of Scituate, born 7 January 1651, baptized 19 January 1650/1, died 16 January 1704 in New London, Connecticut. He married in New London, Connecticut, on 26 December 1678, Susanna Keeney of New London, born 6 September 1662, died there 13 December 1748. Susanna married second in New London, as his second wife, 20 August 1706, Joseph Minor, born in New London 6 August 1666, died there Monday 6 April 1752, aged 86 years, son of Clement and Francis (Burcham)(Willey) Miner.

In 1679, Ezekiel was a sailor with Master Thomas Simond when the bark *Providence* was wrecked on a rock near Fisher's Island, according to his deposition dated November 29th.

Ezekiel Turner died intestate. The inventory of his estate was taken 11 May 1704 and amounted to 217 pounds, 10 shillings, 6 pence. Administration of the estate was granted to widow Susanna and on 9 November 1705 she posted bond with Richard Christophers as Surety. On 1 October 1706, Susanna Minor, "Relict of Ezekiel Turner," presented her accounting of the estate.


On 12 March 1706/7, the Court ordered a division of the "Real and personal estate of Ezekiel Turner, late of New London, deceased." The said real estate contained a "Lott formerly belonging to William Nichols, [and] was, by a deed of Gift, given by **John Keney** of New London to his son and Daughter, Ezekiel Turner, and their heirs for ever...." On 17 June 1707, Susanna (now Susanna Minor, wife of Joseph Minor), claimed the lot and the Court ordered the "use, benefit and profit of said Lott be to said Susanna during her life...." and it was taken out of the inventory.

An addition was made to the inventory on 20 June 1707, recording "several things delivered by the deceased to Jonathan Calkins and to Adam Pickett, as part of his wives portions." Division of the remaining estate of Ezekiel Turner was made 25 November 1707, and recorded 29 November 1707, to widow Susanna (1/3), son Ezekiel (double portion), and the other eleven children, with each child named in the order of their recorded birth. Children, all born or baptized in Scituate:

PULASKI FAMILY MARY J KEENEY (WARREN) PIPE SMOKER, MOTHER OF 11

MARY JANE KEENEY was born 8 Apr 1832 near Pitman's Creek, Lincoln Co KY, the daughter of Henry W Keeney 1798-1874 and Elizabeth Waddle 1801-1870s. Henry's father, Moses 1770-1846, had received a 100 acre land grant there in 1799. Moses was married to Catherine Pence on 13 Dec 1792. The Keeneys were direct descendents of PETER KEENEY, who had accompanied a party led by Matthias Yokum to KY about 1780. Yokum was Peter's father-in-law - both of them had most recently lived along the Roanoke River in Virginia. Virginia records of both families were recorded in Bedford Co. VA, the nearest courthouse since Botetourt, Greenbrier, and Roanoke counties had not yet been organized.

MARY JANE was married to FIELDING LANGFORD WARREN, son of Rev Matthew & Martha Baker Warren, 9 Sept 1852, after an inexpensive courtship leading to a community event of local social importance. The bride owned her own feather bed and a feather tick her own hands had spun. They rode off the next day

on horseback to a small one-room rented house. They had a few hogs, raised some corn, and survived on income earned by the new hisband earned as a hand on a river boat. They longed for a son to assist in earning a living, but EIGHT GIRLS arrived before there was a son.

Fielding taught himself to read and write and made a particular study of the Bible. He joined the Baptist church at age 18 and was made clerk of the church and was later ordained as a deacon and as a minister. The log-cabin KY church met two days a week - on Saturday to talk business, deal with the disorderly and receive new members and on Sunday for Sunday School and exhortation. For this devotion Rev Warren received about \$8 a year.

In 1907, convinced that they needed a rest, the elder Warrens, with three beds, went to visit a daughter and son in Kansas. At ages 82 and 76 and with sound teeth they could still eat corn on the cob.

The Warrens brought KY tobacco along, but were almost in despair as it began to run out. Mother Warren smoked a pipe, from which she received comfort while raising eleven children.

On October 14, 1908 in an interview with the ATCHISON Daily Globe, the elder Warrens listed 85 grandchildren and 32 great grandchildren. Now, almost a century later, who could guess the number of descendents? The family includes:

BIOGRAPHY UNITED STATES AIR FORCE

BRIGADIER GENERAL DOUGLAS KEENEY

Retired, Died Nov. 2, 1979

Douglas Keeney was born in Erie, Mich., in 1895. After graduating from high school at Monroe; Mich., in 1915, he attended Tristate College in Angola, Ind., for two years.

On Aug. 15, 1917, he was commissioned a second lieutenant of Cavairy in the Army Reserve and assigned to active duty at Fort Sheridan, III. He was transferred to the Field Artillery in January 1918, and later that year graduated from flying school, was rated a pilot and transferred to the Air Corps. He was relieved of active duty in 1919.

General Keeney was recalled to active duty with the Air Force as a major in October 1940 and assigned as commanding officer of the primary flying school at Glendale, Calif. A year later he became commandant of students at the AAF flying school at Las Vegas, Nev.; in December 1942, was named executive officer of that base, and in June 1943, became air inspector there

In November 1943; General Keeney went overseas and in February 1944, became executive of the rear echelon of the AAF Service Command in North Africa and Italy. In April 1944 he was named assistant operations officer of the 2618th Headquarters Squadron, Mediterranean Air Transport Service in Italy. He assumed command of Air Base Number One at Rome, Italy, in June 1944, and in March 1945, was named director of operations and traffic for the 2618th Squadron in Italy.

General Keeney returned to the United States in August 1945, and in November 1945, was assigned to Air Transport Command headquarters, Washington, D.C., for indoctrination in policies and procedures.

He was released from active duty in December 1945, with terminal leave until April 1946. He then became general manager of the New Car Dealers Insurance Associates in Pasadena, Calif

In August 1950, General Keeney was recalled to active duty and assigned as a member of the Command Board of Appeals at Continental Air Command headquarters, Mitchel Air Force Base, N.Y. He was transferred to U.S. Air Force headquarters in April 1951, as deputy assistant to the deputy chief for Materiel for the Military Defense Assistance Program.

General Keeney has been awarded the Bronze Star Medal and Air Medal.
