# Missing mother search ongoing

## Metheny's family starts Web site

Three months have passed since Belle resident Melanie Metheny, a mother of three, vanished

This week, her family members launched a Web site, www.findmelanie.com, and increased their reward to \$5,000 in hopes of finding her.

Somebody somewhere has to know something," said her grandmother, Sandra Winnings. You try to be optimistic, but it's been three months. It's been 13 weeks."

Metheny's oldest child is 4 years old. None are old enough to understand the situation.

"What can you tell them? What can you say?" Winnings said. "They don't understand time, thank God. The one says, 'Mom-

my's going to come and get me when she finds her keys."

Kanawha County deputies said tips are coming in slow-

"We're just following up on every lead that we can," Detec-

tive R.A. Lane said. "But nothing new has been brought up.

Police and family members still have no idea why or how Metheny disappeared.

Winnings said family members have blanketed the area with reward and missing-person posters. The family has visited church-

es and asked the congregations for help. "There are lots of them praying for her," Winnings said. Metheny, 21, was last seen July 19 by her boyfriend, Jared

Davis, with whom she some-times stayed in Campbells Creek. Her family and friends got worried that night, after she failed to pick up her children from Country Kids Daycare in Belle.

A few days later, her gold minivan was found parked at the corner of Wyoming Street and Beuhring Avenue on Charles ton's West Side.

Metheny is white, 5 feet 5 inches tall, about 100 pounds, with long strawberry-blond hair and brown eyes. She wants to be a nurse and was taking classes to prepare herself for college-entrance exams.

Roscoe. I am planning a trip to West Virginia at the end of October. I would like to visit a court house or two and I am trying to figure out where I should spend my time. I am descended from Peter Keeney through his son Moses and I know that Peter came from the Greenbrier region. A while back I sent you a copy of an account of the Muddy Creek Massacre that was furnished to me-by-my son-in-law, Mark See. My understand is that there weren't any Keeneys in the area at that time but that when the See and Yoakum families returned to the area after the French and Indian War, John and his son Peter were with them. After that, my timing gets a bit vague. I read somewhere that John Keeney built a fort on Muddy Creek. I assume that was between the French and Indian War and the American Revolution. I don't know if the John Keeney that built the fort was the same John Keeney (Peter's father) that accompanied the See and Yoakum families or if it was some other relation, perhaps a son (Peter's brother?). I get the impression that the John Keeney who built the fort might also be the John Keeney who served in the Revolution.

Penumbra is also interesting. People who knew him said that he was a hard man. He lived much of his life in the American West and must have been a real character. I have two photos of him and a copy of his marriage license. I am aware that there was another Penumbra in the family. He was born after my ancestor and died when he was eleven. I have looked in the Pulaski County courthouse and I cannot find any land transactions involving Penumbra or his wife. It looks like they left for Colorado soon after their marriage. Peter's land had been divided among various descendants many times and there is some evidence that his father was not a very good business man. I wonder if there was anything left for him in Kentucky. Here is my link back to Peter

## A. Traber Gatewood, pioneer McCook dentist, keeper of the secret

Family line: Traber Gatewood b.1898, Theresa Gatewood Cozad 1838-1923, Robert Burke Gatewood 1807-1884 & Julia Ann Jones, Theresa Gatewood 1838-1923f Malden WV & James J Cozad, RANSOM GABRIEL GATEWOOD 1772-1843, ELIZABETH ANN GATEWOOD 1811-1882 & MICHAEL R KEENEY 1804-1875, MOSES KEENEY 1766-1840

In 1873, 21 year old Traber Gatewood accompanied his brother-in-law, John T. Cozad to Nebraska. Cozad was a professional gambler, a familiar figure in the gambling halls of Cincinnati, Chicago, Omaha, San Francisco -- all the stops on the Union Pacific Railroad.

In 1884, Dr. Traber Gatewood married Deborah Francis Burgess at her home in Lebanon, Neb.

For a time the couple resided in Arapahoe. In 1908 they moved to McCook, where Dr. Gatewood operated a dental practice, until his retirement in 1927. It was in McCook where the seven Gatewood children were reared and educated.


John Cozad's brother-in-law, Dr. Traber Gatewood, of McCook, friend of William Jennings Bryant and staunch Democrat, died in 1928. He is buried in Memorial Park Cemetery in McCook.

After hastily leaving Cozad, John J. Cozad made his way to Atlantic City, N.J., where he

assumed a new identity as Richard H. Lee. It was said that after leaving Cozad he never gambled again.

After her husband's death Mrs. (Cozad) Lee moved to New York City to be near her famous artist son. She died there in 1923,

never returning to Nebraska.

#### **OUAKER ROOTS**

Making heads or taile from Keeney (Kinne) records prior to 1700 requires a study from the ENCYCLOPEDIA OF Quaker Genealogy. LDS sources tie some of these records as early as 1691 in Chuckatuck, Isle of Wight VA, listing the birth of John Ke(e)ney, son of John Keney and wifec Catherine. It is of great interest to veteran Keeney researchers that JOHN is confirmed for a Virginia land grant in 1750 and hius wife is listed as Catherine. It is an indisputable fact that this same John Keeney had a fort on Muddy Creek, had sons who fought the Indians after 1783 and thus received land grants in what is now North Carolina, subsequent to later settlements in what became Washington, Greene, Jefferson and Cocke counties as land grants expanded and new counties were formed Detailed Jefferson Co TN records link records of the Keeney family with their Denton and other family members who took similar routes from northern Virginia to eastern Tennessee.

Earlier our ancestors were mingled with Yocum and See families in New Jersey and Maryland, all settling in the eastern West Virginia counties of Hampshire and Hardy counties along the South Branch of the Potomac. From there some migrated South through the Appalachians, with others (as Quakers) accompanied settlers to Nansemond County VA, with subsequent moves across the line into North Carolina and points south.

JACOB DENTON and his wife Mary were associated with the John Kee ney Nansemond family. Jacob was born in 1741 in Jefferson and Hardy Cos VA. And his will shows his death date as 1814 in Jefferson Co. The will states that he lived along the French Broad River TN (with son Jacob.) where Jhn Keeney's sons John, Thomas, Joseph and others lived.

Simultaneously, the Connecticut Nutmegger" reports in 1994 that Alexander Keeney Jr was born in Wethersfield CT and died 22 Jan 1738/9 in New Jersey, where he was joined by his brother Thomas as early as 1694. as a Quaker supporter.

In an E-mail message Richard Russell, son of Robert Denton and Jane Moon, daughter of Jacob Denton SR, states that he descends from Catherine Denton Winton, settling in the northwest corner of Rockingham Co just below the present Hardy Co WV line. He states that Jacob and Mary Denton went to Jefferson Co TN so their daughter could marry Jacob G. Winton and go to Gods Country in 1828.

#### **GRENBRIER VA/WV**

Meanwhile members of the Keeney, Yocum and see families who had followed the South Branch of the Potomac to unsettled farm lands along the Greenbrier River, welcomed a Greenbrier Syndicate In 1745, offering 1,000 acres per family who would settle within five years on the land.
