EARLY CONNECTICUT KEENEYS TRACED

(From Pat Keeney Goyh, Milwaukee, WI) Alexander Keeney first appears in the records of Connecticut in 1666/67 when the town of Weathersfield gave him a piece of land for a home on the west side of Millroad, below Goffe's Bridge; he added more land later.

Alexander servied Alice, the widow of William Colfax, about 1661. They lived in a frame house, shingled and clapboarded. They owned two oxen and two cows, one heifer, one steer, one mare, six swime, and seven sheep.... they grew Indian corn, cats and hay.

They had seven children: Alexander, born in 1662, narried Hannah Searl, daughter of Obedish; Thomas, born in 1664, and Serah (his twin), who married Thomas Brewer on 1-18-1682; Joseph, born in 1666, married Hennah Hills and they had Joseph (11-8-1693) Renjamin (1-1-1695), John (5-22-1699) Arma or Susanna (b.1-6-1700/1), Ashbel. h.11-25-1704, name illegible(5-29-07) d Alexander, born about 1709.

The fourth child, Lydia, was born in 1669. Ebenezer in 1672 and Richard in 1674. Richard married Eunice Loveland and they were the parents of

Richard, Kary and Thomas. Alexander died in 1680 and Alice in 1683.

Daughters of American Gelonists researchers claim that Joseph's son, Alexander was born in 1709, that he married Bunice House, and that they had a son Thomas (1741-1840) who was married to Mercy Lamb (1748-1839).

Ebenezer's education was partly paid by the town after his father's death and Ebenezer himself died before May 2?, 1732, because his son, lk-year old Ebenezer was assigned a guardian then. Ebenezer Sr.'s widow was Alice Colt. Plorence Keeney Robertson, Keeney

genealogist of the early 1900's, says that Ebenezer also had a son John, born in 1712. Many later generations of Keeneys trace their encestry back to him.

Land records in Glastonbury, Conn. show a John Keeney who sold his land in 1737 in exchange for land in Ripton Farish, Stratford, Comm. In 1752, with Samuel Hurd, he bought 152 acres in Kent, Conn. for 3000 pounds. There are no church records from Ripton Par-igh that would werify this family.

Who John married is a mystery, but the will of Sarah Webster's father lists her as the wife of John Keeney. Sarah was a descendent of the colonial governor of Connecticut.

Considering the time that he lived, John surely would have served in the French & Indian Wars and the Revolution. Unfortunately, so many Johns served in the wars that it is impossible to know which is which.

At the Kent town meeting of December 13, 1762, John Keeney was elect-ed grand juryman. In 1764 he was selegted fence viewer and in 1768 was elected surveyor.

In 1762 a deed was made to Ephrian. John's son, and later John gave land to his son, John, Jr. John had a daughter Eather, born 10-15-1754, and a

daughter paned Anna. Mark, son of John, was born 5-1-1740 and died 10-7-18Ch. He is buried at Lacyville, Pa. His tembstone shows that he was engaged in the two wars. He married Abagail Beeman (1739-1804) in 1759. They had many children, the oldest being Anna, born 10-8-1860. Richard was born 5-17-1762, Freelove

KEENEY LINK WITH LEE FAMILY EXPLORED

Visitors at LEE CHAPEL on the campus of Washington & Lee University, Lexington, Va., have often enquired about the lineage of Helen Keensy Lee, whose tomb is there with other members the Lee family. She was the wife of George Bolling Lee, who was the oldest n of William Henry Fitzhugh Lee, the cond son of Robert Edward Lee and

Mary Anne Randolph Custis. The Society of Lees of Virginia did not have genealogical information on Helen, since they truce only the Lee bloodline. However, the Society was helpful in getting us in touch with Mary L. Bowman, daughter of Helen and George, who lives in McLean, Virginia. According to her daughter, Helen K. Lee's father was Dr. Charles C. Keeney and her mother was Adele Marie Jones. Both, she believes, were born in San Francisco, but later moved to New York to go to school. Adele Keeney died in about 19h6 at age 62 or 63. Dr Keeney

American Labor Leaders

KEENEY, C. Frank, Boro in Kanawha County, W. Va.: little is known about his childhood and early adult years; along with Mother Jones (q.v.) organized in 1912 the coal miners of Cabin Creek, W. Va., an area regular United Mine Workers of America (UMWA) organizers feared to enter; along with Fred Mooney (q.v.) and Lawrence Dwyer, a UMWA international organizer, established three years later an insurgent district. District 30, in the Cabin Creek area to protest alleged corruption and inefficiency on the part of President Thomas Cairus (q.v.) and other officials of District 17, UMWA, West Virginia; after District 17 was reorganized by the international union in 1917, elected its president and served until 1924; within a year of becoming president, helped District 17 add 10,000 members, pay off a \$35,000 debt, and show a treasury surplus of \$25,000; in 1919, along with the governor of West Virginia, prevented a threatened union miners' murch into population territory that promised to result in violence: again in 1921, along with state and federal officials, prevented a second march: an attack by state policymen and Logan County deputies on a union tent colony at Sharples, W. Va., in 1922, however, ignited a nurch resulting in the "Battle of Blair Mountain", in which three deputies were killed and 40 miners wounded; indicted as a result of the conflict, but acquitted of treason and murder; while under indictment, elected penident of the West Virginia State Federation of Labor (WVSFL): defeated for reelection by John Easton (q.v.) in a craft union movement to earb the

power of the UMWA in the WVSFL; after his defeat, his UMWA supporters in southern West Virgunia onycotted (in WVSFI, nutil 1927; along with Mouncy, resigned his UMWA offices in 1924 to protest UMWA president Juliu L. Lewis's (q.v.) attempt to enforce the Jucksonville scale in West Virginia, a policy tacy charged would destroy the union there: thereafter, the district was administered by provisional presidents Percy Tetlow (q.v.), and, later, Var. A. Bittner (q.v.); moved to Illimois in 1926 to out The Coal Miner, an official organ of John Brophy's (q.v.) "Save the Union "compaign; during 1927-1930, was first the proprietor of an orange drink stand and then an oil and gas speculator; in 1930, joined John II. Wilker (q.v.), Frank Farrington (q.v.). Alexander Howat (q.v.), and Osear Ameringer in the Bearganized United Mine Workers; after Walker reaf-Shated with the regular UMWA and other leaders were expelled in 1931, founded his own West Virginia Miners' Union, which grew rapidly hut destroyed (iself with a strike during depressed constitions; became an American Federation of Labor organizer for the Progressive Mine Workers of America in 1935 and organized three West Virginia locals, oil of which were destroyed by the UMWA's 1959 union stop agreement: thereafter, itis career deteriorated, and his last known job wax as a parking-iot attendant; according to relatives, still living in 1973; Evelyn L. K. Harris and Frank J. Krehs, From Humble Beginnings: West Virginia State Federalism of Labor, 1903-1937 (1960); J. W. Hess, ed., Struggle in the Coal Fields: The Antolnogeneiter of Fred Muoney (1967); Irving Bernstein, The Lean Years: A History of the American Workers, 1920-1903 (1960).

Joshum and Michard left Kent. It is said that Joshum was an Indian trader and spoke five Indian dialects. Both he and Sichard would up in Luzerne Co., Fa., an area contested by Connection and Fennsylvania, but ceded by Congress to Yennsylvania.

The brothers bought land in 1789 and Joshua went back to Kent to marry Phobe Stundivant. His parents, Hark and Abigail, and his brother Thomas accompanied the newlyweds to Pennsylvania.

Thomas, husband of Mercy Last, was active in the Connecticut Claim to land and was involved in the abduction of Timothy Pickering, a Pennsylvania leader. His role was downlayed in a trial, but he served as 6 months term, refusing several chances to accase.

ODETTE KEENE, VIOLINIST

OBSTI REME was born Opal Reeney in Jantaco, Iora, in 1897, the only child of Frank and Nellie Keerey. A year later the faulty served to Kegunictu. They were a unitical faulty. Henry Keerey had a dance ornebatra, which he turned over to his som Frank, who passed it to to his daughter. Frank gave generously of his time to developing new talent and for the Concert Band that he managed for many years,

In 1515 she preducted with honors from Requesta Righ School. At 16 she went on Connect Outchester. Upon returning to Mequesta, Odette taught music and denoting and, in 1925, organised The Melody Maids, a concert group which became popular in Eastern Iowa. Her specialty was playing violin and dancing simultancouncy to Drahn's Fifth Eugmerican Pance.

In 1929 Odette went to New York and joined the Yiolinstites, four girls who worked in the Dave Harris Rewem "Twricty Land". They toured the scuthern states, played in Canada and in New York.

Returning again to lows, Ms. Keens formed her comband, "Oddette Keens and her Occusative", presenting the latest and best in dence made. Annual recitals featured orchestres, instrumental solicits singers, as well as dramatic song and dance sketches. The last recital included a prize to the 1,000th pmylls.

In 1952 Obstee moved to Hollywood to write music for the morie, "#110 of Por Victory". She joined the facualty of Hollywood Theatrical Training Studio as votal coach and suranger, later opening the Oddett Keen Studio. Ser pupils included many children, among then Bebbie Reprolds. "The Oddett Keens Stewer Playwo casuals at lodge affairs, college programs, military bases and 1950 clabs."

Eay inthony recorded her song, "So I Said Yes" in his albus, "That's Show Biz."

Odette Reene (Keeney) was elected to membership in ASCAP in 1961 as was a life member of the American Federation of Musicians. She died January 1, 1986.
