### September 2003 CAPT. ROGER WYATT KEENEY It could be said that Roger Woatt Keeney was born to be a boat man. As a young

man, growing up in his home town of Witcher, WV the family home was situated

on a lovely knoll overlooking the Kanawha River. As a young man, Roger worked

for his father, Fred Keeney, who operated a river transportation and construction

It was during this time that Roger probably began thinking that life on the river, hopefully as a boat captain, might be in his future. After a hitch in The US Coast Guard, serving on PT Boats potrolling the Carribean Sea, Roger returned to civilian life and resumed working for his Dad, until the business was sold in 1962. He then went to work for the O. F. Shearer Company as a pilot. He was promoted to boat captain two years later. O. F. Shearer was sold to Indiana Power Co. in 1973, and later became American Electric Power Systems (AEP), with all employees being transferred with the changes.

At intervals he relieved the Port Captain and on occasion, also relieved the Dock Superintendent. During his last few years with AEP, his duties

included training new pilots while doing his regular job as Captain.

AEP's River Division is currently located on the Ohio River at Lakin, WV. It owns and operates 15 towboats, 2 harbor boats, and over 600 barges. In 2000, AEP

delivered over 28,000,000 tons of coal and aggregate products. It also maintains

While he was working, Roger's family had located to the Charleston, SC area and after retiring, Roger and his wife Etta also settled in that lovely historic city on the Atlantic coast. "Home is the sailor; home from the sea." - but not too far from the scal

It was shortly after Roger's retirement that AEP announced that they were building four new 2800-hp towboats and that one of the boats would bear his name. This was a nice tribute because AEP boats are normally not named for former captains who are still living. In its company newsletter, "The Helm" AEP stated: "Captain Roger Keeney recently retired from River Division with 32 years of service. His distinguished career is marked by outstanding leadership abilities, while maintaining a balance between management and crew members. He trained many of our present employees and remains an excellent role model for

To further know him, AEP brought Roger and Fits from their Charleston home for the launching of the Roger W. Keeney at the Jeffboat Shippard in Jeffersonville, IN. To his great delight, Roger was asked to skipper his new... namesake on her maiden voyage back to the company's docks at Lakin. It must have been a great feeling, tooling along the Ohio with a brand-new boot under you - and bearing your name along its side!

In a letter to Keeney Update, Roger sums up his feelings: "I have 35 years of life on the river, of which I wouldn't trade a minute of it because of the experiences I've had. Hoved every minute of it, and never wanted anything else. I'm proud and thankful that I was able to accomplish my hopes and dreams."

#### NOVELIST, VISITS SALEM, MA June 1, 2003

Doherty (my pastor's wife), who recently accompanied me on a research trip to Salem Massachusetts. I am now working on the sea voyage. My research trip to Salem in April was a rousing success. I accomplished many

great things, one of which was the location of the Keeney graveyard. Since most of the early markers were made of wood, none of them were left, however. I did find a couple of graves from the Dale family (into which the Keeneys married). Bob Osgood, the curator of the Rebecca Nurse house, who graciously gave

Ruby and I a private viewing of the property, told me of the graveyard's existence. He said that Henry and his family and descendants were buried there. He also told me where to find the old Putnam Family graveyard and the location of the grave of little Ann Putnam, who began the hysteria of 1692. Her grave, which also contains the remains of her parents, is only a large mound, completely and understandably unmarked.

Ruby and I also located Henry Keeney's land, which runs between the ends of Nichols and Preston Streets in Danvers. I was able to gather some dirt and a small stone from the land, as well as a large rock from the Keeney graveyard.

Mr. Osgood also told me that when the Keeneys originally came to Salem, they

lived on Liberty Street. The house, of course, is long gone, but I did manage to get my picture taken under the street sign. Mr. Osgood, who is of indeterminate age, suffering from a recent stroke, which left him partially paralyzed, was a wealth of information on the Keeney family's early beginnings. Never did I imagine when I first contacted him regarding a private viewing of the Nurse property, that he would spend so much time gathering information about our family in preparation for my arrival. He also allowed me to take a photograph of an old picture of the house of George Jacobs. The Nurse estate has the only copy in existence of that photo.

Ruby and I also toured a replica of the original meetinghouse, which was built fo

the filming of the movie. Three Sovereigns for Sarah. The inside is original and Mr. Osgood allowed us to listen to a presentation that is being prepared for tourists. He also permitted us to take many pictures of the meetinghouse and allowed us to view the upstairs of the Rebecca Nurse house (which is usually off-limits to tourists). I have an entire CD filled with pictures and a storehouse of wonderful memories

On our last day in Massachusetts, Ruby and I drove to New Hampshire. I had found a tourist brochure in the hotel lobby and learned that there were four towns in the state that were the first settled. Knowing that Sir Thomas immigrated to New

As the hobby continues on, it is always important to pay attention to the new and younger participants, because they will be the ones to carry the traditions and stories of the hobby on to the next generation of Revolutionary War reenactors: Less experienced reenactors come into the hobby and are naturally expected to learn from the older more seasoned reenactors. These two groups work side by side and together take the hobby to the next level of historical value. Here, however, I want to pay tribute to someone who has been a devoted reenactor since the

One of those "seasoned" reenactors, Norwood Keeney, is going to retire from the hobby this year, or at least he . thinks so. Norwood is a veteran of the Bicentennial campaigns, and the First New Hampshire Regiment has been his home throughout his recnacting career. I first met Norwood in 1976 when I was a member of the Bolton, Massachusetts Militia. Norwood commanded the First New Hampshire at a Bicentennial recnactment celebration sponsored by the Bolton Militia. While I spent the next several years with the Seventh Massachusetts Regiment and Cantain Nathaniel Donnell's Company of the Third Continental Artillery, it was primarily because of my relationship with Norwood that I eventually gravitated to the First New Hampshire, which he still commanded. Sometimes over the years, Norwood and I would talk about politics. Being a Connecticut transplant to New Hampshire, it was only natural for Norwood to be a good Republican by political persuasion. Now Norwood has retired from reenacting altogether. Well, guess what? Norwood will never be retired from this hobby. stead (1754-1831), Revolutionary War veteran, died on 3 Sept 1859 at age 87 at Galena IL. Manuel Lisa was the first white farmer in Nebraska. He employed one hundred mea, for whom he provided cab-

employed one hundred men, for whom he provided cabius, and had hundreds of horses, cattle, hogs and fowls. He brought to Nebraska the seed of the green squash, the lima bean, the potato and the turnip, introducing them to the Indian tribes.
